

Comment Article – “Reformation thoughts”

As Lutherans we know that Paul’s epistle to the Romans in particular had a profound impact on the great Reformer.

Again and again, he contemplated Romans 1: 17: “For in it the righteousness of God is revealed from faith to faith; as it is written, ‘The just shall live by faith’.”

The righteousness of God is granted to mankind on the basis of their faith, not their good works. Only that comes into being which God, in his mercy, accords mankind.

Man is sinful—God alone can justify us: “Therefore, as through one man’s offense judgement came to all men, resulting in condemnation, even so through one Man’s righteous act, the free gift came to all men, resulting in justification of life” (Romans 5: 18).

There was a downside, there is always a downside, as well as an upside!

As a result, Western Christianity split up into the Catholic, Lutheran, and Reformed Churches.

It was in 1517 that he nailed his Ninety-Five Theses to the door of the castle church in Wittenberg.

This triggered a difficult time of discovery and reflection on the essentials, which endured 150 years. The Peace of Westphalia of 1648 is generally considered the conclusion of the Reformation.


But in between times, the people of Europe were forced to endure great upheaval.



Did You Know?

- That, the Reformation (alternatively named the Protestant Reformation or the European Reformation) was “a major movement within Western Christianity” in 16th-century Europe that posed a religious and political challenge to the Catholic Church and in particular to papal authority, arising from what were perceived to be “errors, abuses, and discrepancies by the Catholic Church.”
- That, the Reformation was the start of Protestantism and the split of the Western Church into Protestantism and what is now the Roman Catholic Church. It is also considered to be one of the events that signified the end of the Middle Ages and the beginning of the early modern period in Europe.
- That, prior to Martin Luther, there were many earlier reform movements.
- That, although the Reformation is usually considered to have started with the publication of the *Ninety-five Theses* by Martin Luther in 1517, he was not excommunicated by Pope Leo X until January 1521.
- That, the Diet of Worms of May 1521 condemned Luther and officially banned citizens of the Holy Roman Empire from defending or propagating his ideas.
- That, the spread of Gutenberg's printing press provided the means for the rapid dissemination of religious materials in the vernacular.
- That, Luther survived after being declared an outlaw due to the protection of Elector Frederick the Wise.
- That, the initial movement in Germany diversified, and other reformers such as Huldrych Zwingli and John Calvin arose.
- In general, the Reformers argued that salvation in Christianity was a completed status based on faith in Jesus alone and not a process that requires good works, as in the Catholic view.
- That, the Counter-Reformation, also called the *Catholic Reformation* or the *Catholic Revival*, was the period of Catholic reforms initiated in response to the Protestant Reformation.
- That, The end of the Reformation era is disputed.

- **Thrivent and Action Teams** help to support our ministry!




Council Capsules

Sunday School - *All children ages 4 thru 6th grade are welcome. Kids can join us at any time throughout the school year.*

Rally Day is behind us, and I'd like to thank Lori and Brian Rathmann for helping on that day. Sunday School classes have officially started for the school year. A big thank you to Mary Jo Meier for volunteering to be a teacher this year as this will allow us to split into two classes – 4-year-olds thru 1st Grade and 2nd-5th Grade, which is great! I would encourage all parents and grandparents to consider having their kids and grandkids join us for future classes.

We're focusing on the stories of the Old Testament (or Hebrew Bible) this school year and have learned about the Bible and the Story of Creation. October lessons will continue to focus on stories from Genesis ("In the beginning") – The First Family, Safe in the Ark, Abraham Answers God's Call, Jacob is Forgiven, and Joseph Faces Tough Times.

Pericope – Pericope is back in session so feel free to stop by the Kitchen on Sunday mornings at 9am.

First Communion Classes – *Held for ages 7 and older.*

Fall First Communion Classes are being held this month and will run for four weeks starting on Saturday, October 8th. Those interested should call the office to sign-up.

Confirmation - *Confirmation classes started in September and will continue through May.*



Yom Kippur

The Day of Atonement

We are sure you have heard of “Yom Kippur.” Did you know this is the holiest of day for our Jewish brothers and sisters?

It is a day of fasting. It is a day of prayer. It is a day of remembering.

Likewise, we are sure you have heard of the Day of Atonement. Yom Kippur IS the day of Atonement. Primarily centered on atonement and repentance, the day's observances consist of full fasting and ascetic behavior accompanied by intensive prayer as well as sin confessions.

What is the purpose of “Atonement?”

Atonement (also atoning, to atone) is the concept of a person taking action **to correct previous wrongdoing on their part**, either through direct action to undo the consequences of that act, equivalent action to do good for others, or some other expression of feelings of remorse.

Yom Kippur begins at sundown on October 4th and ends at sundown on October 5th. See the book of Leviticus 16.29, 23.27 for more details.



Columbus Day



Indigenous People's Day

Columbus Day is a U.S. holiday that commemorates the landing of Christopher Columbus in the Americas in 1492, and Columbus Day 2022 occurs on Monday, October 10. It was unofficially celebrated in a number of cities and states as early as the 18th century but did not become a federal holiday until 1937.

The first national Columbus Day was proclaimed in 1892 by Republican President Benjamin Harrison to celebrate the 400th anniversary of Italian-born explorer Christopher Columbus's supposed discovery of America.

The practice of U.S. cities eschewing Columbus Day to celebrate Indigenous Peoples' Day began in 1992 with Berkeley, California.

The list of cities which have followed suit as of 2018 includes Austin; Boise; Cincinnati; Denver; Los Angeles; Mankato, Minnesota; Philadelphia; Portland, Oregon; San Francisco; Santa Fe, New Mexico; Seattle; St. Paul, Minnesota; Phoenix; Tacoma, and "dozens of others".

On October 8, 2021, it was proclaimed that October 11 would be recognized as Indigenous Peoples' Day by the Federal Government but Columbus Day was also issued a proclamation acknowledging it as the Federal Holiday and the contributions of Italian Americans.




Now, you have plenty of warning!



Reformation Day – 2022

While the rest of the world celebrates a “spooky holiday,” the vast majority of the Christian community celebrates Reformation Day.

Martin Luther’s study of the scripture led him to a path he recognized as religious truth and salvation. He disagreed with the church’s teaching of the Bible, with the priest serving as intermediaries between the Scriptures and the laity.

He also strongly disagreed with the sale of indulgences whose proceeds were used to renovate and rebuild portions of St. Peter’s in Vatican City.

At a given point and time, it was the Germanic people alone that were being targeted and solicited for monies.

Many opposed the various movements of the church, but Martin Luther brought it to light and sought reformation from within the church itself.

To his credit, he wanted it to first be debated by the scholars of the church. It was to be an academic matter only.

His 95 Theses gave grounds for people to question the church, it was a time of large religious and social change and upheaval.


Luther preached reformation and reform, but his theses was warped for political, social, and economic reasons by various emerging leaders of the movement.

This brought forth a kind of fractionalization in the Catholic church and the emergence of the Protestant Reformation under the Protestant Church.

Reformation Day is recognized by a number of communities around the world, especially “the Protestants” ...the name coming from those who “protested the abuse within Catholicism.”

It is an “official holiday” in most Germanic states and seeks to celebrate the significant religious reforms brought on by the “95 Theses.”

Reformation Day stands for the truth...and the Bible (the Holy Scriptures) are seen as being the sole source of religious authority, not the church, not the Pope, not a priest...nor a council of the church...rather it is the WORD OF GOD that is lifed up.



St. Luke's – October 18th

(NOT celebrated by us this year!)

...one of the Four Evangelists—the four “traditionally ascribed authors” of the “canonical gospels.” The Early Church Fathers ascribed to him authorship of both the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles, which would mean Luke contributed over a quarter of the text of the Early Christian Writings, more than any other author. Prominent figures in early Christianity such as Jerome and Eusebius later reaffirmed his authorship, although a lack of conclusive evidence as to the identity of the author of the works has led to discussion in scholarly circles, both secular and religious.

The Early Christian Writings mention Luke briefly a few times, and the Epistle to the Colossians refers to him as a physician (from Greek for 'one who heals'); thus he is thought to have been both a physician and a disciple of Paul.

Since the early years of the faith, Christians have regarded him as a saint. He is believed to have been a martyr, reportedly having been hanged from an olive tree, though some believe otherwise. The church celebrates him as Saint Luke the Evangelist and as a patron saint of artists, physicians, bachelors, surgeons, students and butchers; his feast day is 18 October. Until late November our gospel texts will continue to come from the “good doctor.”

All Saints Sunday

November 6th, 2022

(Our Namesake!)

All Saints' Day, also called All Hallows' Day, Hallowmas, or Feast of All Saints, in the Christian church, a day commemorating all the saints of the church, both known and unknown, who have attained heaven.

It is celebrated on November 1 in the Western churches and on the first Sunday after Pentecost in the Eastern churches.

It is also celebrated on the FIRST SUNDAY IN NOVEMBER, if not on the actual day.

The origin of All Saints' Day cannot be traced with certainty, and it has been observed on various days in different places.

A feast of all martyrs was kept on May 13 in the Eastern church according to Ephraem Syrus (died c. 373), which may have determined the choice of May 13 by Pope Boniface IV when he dedicated the Pantheon in Rome as a church in honour of the Blessed Virgin and all martyrs in 609.

The first evidence for the November 1 date of celebration and of the broadening of the festival to include all saints as well as all martyrs occurred during the reign of Pope Gregory III (731–741), who dedicated a chapel in St. Peter's, Rome, on November 1 in honor of all saints. In 800 All Saints' Day was kept by Alcuin on November 1, and it also appeared in a 9th-century English calendar on that day.

In 837 Pope Gregory IV ordered its general observance. In medieval England the festival was known as All Hallows, and its eve is still known as Halloween. The period from October 31 to November 2 (All Souls' Day) is sometimes known as Allhallowtide.





Pumpkin Bars

Recipe submitted by Linda Steinbauer

Ingredients

- 2 c. sugar
- 4 eggs
- 2 c. flour
- $\frac{3}{4}$ c. melted butter
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. soda
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp cinnamon
- 2 cups pumpkin
- 1 c. nuts (optional)

DIRECTIONS

Mix eggs, sugar, pumpkin and butter together. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and cinnamon. Add to batter. Stir in chopped nuts. Pour batter into jelly roll or 2 (9x13 inch) pans that have been greased and floured. Bake in preheated 325 degree oven for 25 minutes. Cool on rack and frost when cool. For frosting combine 1 pkg. softened cream cheese, 6 T. butter, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1 T. light cream or half and half, 3 c. powdered sugar. Beat at low speed until smooth and of good spreading consistency. Spread on cooled bars and cut.




Just for Laughs...
