#### **Comment Article:** Like a school assignment – "Why do you love Easter?"



I love Easter for a lot of reasons. See if any of mine resonate with you, personally. I love the visual image of the Empty Tomb. I always have. The mysterium trimendum.

(The tremendous mystery) I love the mystery... and the unanswered questions. The majesty of the moment I can see in my mind's eye. The empty tomb. Silent. Alone. Stark. For me the Empty Tomb reveals that God is faithful...is, always has been, and always will be. That is part of the nature of my God.

The Empty Tomb early on Easter morning reveals that God is powerful. My God is more powerful than "any storm in this life of ours," more powerful than anything that can happen to me, including death itself. My God always has the final say...the final word (if you will.)

We human beings are capable of some pretty amazing things too, but we'll all die, and there's nothing we can do about it. But with my God, all things are possible...and always have been. Again, that is part of his nature.

The Empty Tomb reveals to me that my God is loving. As a matter of fact, I have always embraced the WORD that says, "GOD IS LOVE."

Even when we're unloving and rebellious, full of ourselves and wanting our own way, God is loving. He delights in transforming us by his grace and rescuing us by his love. It is who he is. And I am forever thankful that he is...

The Empty Tomb guarantees our eternity. I have never believed that death is an end in itself. Matter once created always exists in some form or another. God, our God has taken us to himself. We are blessed by him.

God will raise us out of this broken world into a paradise where sin and suffering will be no more. And I for one, can't wait. As a matter of fact along with the psalmists of old...I have often thought, at this point in my life, I am "waiting on the Lord." For me, that is not a bad thing. It is hopeful. Expectant.

The Empty Tomb guarantees security. I know that sounds odd. Emptiness and security in the same breath...in the same sentence.

But no matter how unpredictable and out-of-control life might feel and / or actually be, God is reigning, and he will continue to reign until the final enemy is under his feet. That does not mean we won't experience pain and hurt in this world, (obviously, duh!) but it does mean there's nothing ... no thing...that God does not know about, cannot intervene in, or alter altogether. God is always with us, constantly present for us. A very real help in trouble and when we are in danger...

# And finally, I think, the Empty Tomb guarantees us delivery...no I am not thinking like Grub Hub or Door Dash or Uber Eats...but rather...

No matter how hopeless and weak we might think we are, we've been provided with all the grace we need to make it to the end. Future grace always carries with it the promise of present grace. God will provide everything we need until we see him face to face...and again, I cannot wait.


I long to be united with the source of my being again.

Even if you don't believe in the notion that Jesus' death was preordained, a ransom for our sins, or that God required Jesus' death to deliver us from sin and open the doors to eternal life, the Cross describes the realities of human suffering, abandonment, and death, often at the hands of powerful governmental and religious institutions. The collection of Jesus' final words gives voice to the experiences of persons in oncology wards, hospices, victims of torture and abuse, or among survivors of natural disasters.

The traditional ordering of the Seven Last Words is as follows:

"Father forgive them, for they know not what they do."

"Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise."

"Woman, behold your son: behold your mother."

"My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?"

"I thirst."

"It is finished."

"Father, into your hands I commit my spirit."
You may choose to meditate upon the meaning of these words. In the spirit of *lectio divina*, or holy/wholly reading, you might let the words have a life of their own, emerging as the spirit inspires you, without concern for historical or literary accuracy. Imaginative in structure and organization, these words are most effective when we let "our own imaginations

wander," opening to God's inspiration for us in our own unique setting.

# **April Fools!**

(We know you wondered about its origins!)

April Fools' Day—celebrated on April 1 each year—has been celebrated for several centuries by different cultures, though its exact origins remain a mystery. April Fools' Day traditions include playing hoaxes or practical jokes on others, often yelling "April Fools!" at the end to clue in the subject of the April Fools' Day prank. While its exact history is shrouded in mystery, the embrace of April Fools' Day jokes by the media and major brands has ensured the unofficial holiday's long life.

Some historians speculate that April Fools' Day dates back to 1582, when France switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar, as called for by the Council of Trent in 1563. In the Julian Calendar, as in the Hindu calendar, the new year began with the spring equinox around April 1.

People who were slow to get the news or failed to recognize that the start of the new year had moved to January 1 and continued to celebrate it during the last week of March through April 1 became the butt of jokes and hoaxes and were called "April fools." These pranks included having paper fish placed on their backs and being referred to as "poisson d'avril" (April fish), said to symbolize a young, easily caught fish and a gullible person.

#### **Liturgy Committee**

Welcome to Easter, spring, and the promise of new life!

'Tis a busy time of year for your Liturgy Committee. Lent and Easter are huge in the life of the church! Consider joining the fun and becoming part of the liturgy committee! Your help is always welcome.

The Purpose, Mission and Responsibilities of your liturgy committee have been updated. The revised version was approved at the March council meeting. You can read them here...

#### **Mission/Purpose Statement**

God gifts us the sacred liturgy and calls us to worship. One of the ways in which we show our love for one another is through our service to our community. As members of the All Saints Lutheran Church Liturgy Committee, we are committed to preparing a beautiful altar and helping to create an enriching and welcoming liturgical experience for all who join us. It is by carrying out our service with love, care, and kindness that we endeavor to fulfill our purpose, that all who enter feel welcomed, uplifted, and may leave feeling peace and joy.

#### The major responsibilities of overseeing the worship liturgies include;

- Regular planning to make liturgies special.
- Scheduling special liturgies (i.e., outdoor liturgy, pet blessing, etc.)
- Organizing special events such as Weddings, Funerals, Baptisms. Working with Christian Education and/or Youth Committees to plan First Communion and Confirmation events.
- Altar paraments and banner changes per church calendar.
- Create and provide training programs for ushers, acolytes, Communion Team, lectors and layliturgists as needed.
- Banners purchase, creation, care and upkeep.
- Maintain supply of Host (bread/wafers) and Wine.
- Maintain supply of all candles and altar oils for the sanctuary and baptisms.
- Care and upkeep of altar paraments.
- Setting up the hymn board prior to each liturgy.
- Upkeep of piano and musical instruments.
- Care and repair of the white hymnals.
- Burn previous years palms for Ash Wednesday.
- Care and cleaning of Acolyte and Choir robes as needed.
- Work with the Agape Supper Ad-hoc Committee to plan the event, set it up and help run it.
- Liturgy Chairperson is also a member of the Memorial Committee.

At the heart of the church is our congregation coming together to worship as a family. The Liturgy Committee ensures that the sanctuary is properly set up and the supplies are present and in good repair. The committee is also responsible for all of the people in front of and behind the scenes who work together to effectuate smoothly run worship liturgies.



#### **Swedish meatballs**

**Recipe submitted by Mary Anderson** 

#### Ingredients

- 1 ½ lbs. hamburger
- ½ c. milk
- 2 tsp. salt (dash pepper)
- 1/4 tsp. allspice
- ¼ c. finally chopped onion
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 ½ c. soft bread crumbs
- ½ tsp. nutmeg
- 2 tbsp oil
- 2 tbsp flour
- 1 c. consommé' or beef broth

#### **DIRECTIONS**


Mix well, form into balls. Heat 2 tbsp. Of oil in a heavy skillet, add meatballs, a few at a time and brown slowly. Remove from pan. Add 2 tbsp flour to the skillet, blend well. Add 1 cup (10 ½ oz) consommé' or beef broth. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Return meatballs to gravy, cover and simmer 15 minutes. Enjoy!


