Comment Article: The Year ahead.



What ought we to expect for the next twelve months? God only knows, right?

What will we encounter along the way?

A person of faith can and must go forward with hope. "The one who has hope," "lives differently."

Of the three theological virtues — faith, hope, and love — hope is often the one that receives the least attention, left to some vague supporting role, which is often confused with mere optimism. The Apostle Paul, in particular, communicates time and again his preference for faith and love "over hope."

"If I have all faith, so as to remove mountains," he writes to the Corinthians, "but do not have love, I am nothing.

If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing."

Or more memorable, "Faith, hope, and love remain, these three.

But the greatest of these is love." Hey, wait a minute! What about "hope?"

It's important to note that this hope isn't blind. Not at all.

It isn't thinking that everything is okay and will be okay because it always is, and because good people somewhere will always do what is right.

It isn't cheerful or naïve.

It isn't the refusal to see the somber realities ahead and instead dreams of a world without such obstacles.

Hope doesn't deny an awful reality; it looks it in the face and still, it *hopes*. It acknowledges that there is good in this life even if it can't be seen right here and now.

Hope is not blind; rather, it changes how we see things.

It does this not by averting our eyes from a difficult reality, but by drawing our eyes to it so that something different can reveal itself.

Whether we see it or not, hope is alive.

It is alive in anyone who has suffered intense loss and kept moving, who has made the decision to love another with no promise of a return, who has doubted the existence of God and yet prayed anyway, and who has endured suffering for the sake of someone else and actually found great strength in doing so.

What will 2023 bring?

Heaven knows. God knows...it is beyond my pay scale.

But we do know what we must bring to 2023 and hang on to it with dear life!

And that - will make all the difference. Maybe even a huge difference.

Praying for you, and for us...be hopeful!

Voting is personal!


Did You Know?

(All About Epiphany!)

- January 6 is observed as "a church festival" in commemoration of the coming of the Magi as
 the first manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles or in the Eastern Church in commemoration of
 the baptism of Christ.
- an "appearance or manifestation" especially of a divine being
- a usually sudden manifestation or perception of the essential nature or meaning of something
- an "intuitive grasp" of reality through something (such as an event) usually simple and striking
- an illuminating discovery, realization, or disclosure
- The word Epiphany actually comes from Greek.
- Epiphanea is the word in Greek.
- The word epiphany originally referred to insight "through the divine."
- In the Christian tradition, Epiphany (ə-PIF-ə-nee) is a festival celebrating Christ's appearance to the Gentiles, observed every year on January 6.
- From the "Christian sense" we get an additional religious sense, "the appearance of a god or deity" and the more common modern usage, a noun meaning "a sudden revelation."
- There's nothing religious about most epiphanies these days your "Eureka!" moment could come when you realize that you're in the wrong line of work and you need to quit your job to join the circus.
- Another example of an epiphany might be Isaac Newton's realization that a falling apple and the orbiting moon are both pulled by the same force.
- Epiphany is one of the three principal and oldest festival days of the Christian church (the other two are Easter and Christmas).
- Roman Catholics, Lutherans, Anglicans, and other Western churches observe the feast on January 6, while some Eastern Orthodox churches celebrate Epiphany on January 19, since their Christmas Eve falls on January 6.
- In Rome, by 354 Christ's birth was being celebrated on December 25 (Christmas), and later in the 4th century, the church in Rome began celebrating Epiphany on January 6.
- In the West the evening preceding Epiphany is called Twelfth Night.
- The time between December 25 and January 6 is known as the Twelve Days of Christmas.



January is named after Janus, the ancient Roman god of gates and doors symbolizing endings, beginnings, and transitions. He's depicted with two heads: one head looking at the past and the other at the future.



Martin Luther King Jr. Day (officially the Birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr., and sometimes referred to as MLK Day) is a federal holiday in the United States marking the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr. It is observed on the third Monday of January each year. "In the End, we will remember not the words of our enemies, but the silence of our friends." "Freedom is never voluntarily given by the oppressor; it must be demanded by the oppressed."

Meeting was called to order by Tim at 18:10.

We reviewed the annual raises for our paid employees. We took into consideration that the inflation rate has averaged 7.1%. Since it was such a large increase, we now recommend a 5% raise.

We spoke about the insurance policies that we are paying. It was decided that the medical coverage should not be changed. However, I will at least check to see if we could get a better rate for the building and liability insurance.

I inquired about why mortgage did not have a large tax bill. Since we are a Church, we pay only about \$400 a year on the land. Which we pay directly from our checking account. That leaves us with the mortgage of just \$1356 per month.


The rest of the meeting was reviewing the accounting of our different accounts, such as "Special Purpose Accounts".

We will not be ordering envelopes again this year (saving our church more than \$700.00 We are recycling the offering envelopes from years past.




So again, let us know if you need envelopes. Thanks...

And now, we wait...



Epiphany is the day and the season of the church year when we patiently watch and listen as God is quietly revealed before us once again. Sometimes, even when we try hard to do so, we just don't see God in our everyday lives or in the events of our troubled world. Epiphany gives us the time and the resources to watch, wait, listen, look, anticipate, and discern the light, life, and truth of the Lord's presence in our midst.

But,

Epiphany is more than a day!

Contemporary observances of Epiphany include the coming of wise men with gifts for the Christ child and the baptism of Jesus. The season concludes with Transfiguration Sunday, when the church remembers the radiant vision of the disciples who saw Jesus' garments turn bright and they heard a voice from a cloud that overshadowed them saying, "This is my Son, whom I dearly love. Listen to him!" (Mark 9:7).

Epiphany is an entire season!

Epiphany is the time when the church gathers to remember and reflect on the mighty acts of God in the birth of Jesus Christ. As we watch and wait for the light of Christ to overcome the darkness, we see the Christ child who will become a prophet, healer, teacher, and savior. Much of the story remains to be told, but the biblical readings for Epiphany remind us of the direction in which this one sacred life is moving. Here was life at its purest and best. A life lived as it should be lived. A life that came from God, walked with God in the world, and would one day be fully back with God in the world to come (John 13:3). The life of Jesus is our light and model for how we too may live. As we recognize the image of our true humanity in the life of Jesus Christ, we also begin to understand that we have come from God, are invited to walk in faithfulness with God in this world, and one day will be welcomed to our eternal home. There we will still be with the God who loves us beyond our capacity to fully understand.

Epiphany (also known as **Twelfth Night**, *Theophany*, or **Three Kings Day**) marks the occasion of a time-honored Christian tradition of "chalking the doors."

The formula for the ritual — adapted for 2023 — is simple: take chalk of any color and write the following above the entrance of your home: 20 + C + M + B + 23.

The letters have two meanings. First, they represent the initials of the Magi — **Caspar**, **Malchior**, and **Balthazar** — who came to visit Jesus in His first home.

They also abbreviate the Latin phrase, *Christus mansionem benedicat*: "May Christ bless the house."

The "+" signs represent the cross, the "20" at the beginning and the "23" at the end mark the year.

Taken together, this inscription is performed as a request for Christ to bless those homes so marked and that He stay with those who dwell therein throughout the entire year

The chalking of the doors is a centuries-old practice throughout the world, though it appears to be somewhat less well-known in the United States.

It is, however, an easy tradition to adopt, and a great practice whereby we dedicate our year to God from its very outset, asking His blessing on our homes and on all who live, work, or visit them there.

The timing for the chalking of the doors varies somewhat in practice.

In some places, it is done on New Year's Day. More commonly, it is performed on the traditional Feast of the Epiphany — **the Twelfth Day of Christmas**.




Time to gather again with our church family!

Spaghetti and Meatball "Stoup"

(thicker than soup, thinner than stew)

Level: EasyTotal: 45 minPrep: 20 minCook: 25 minYield: 4 servings

Ingredients

2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, 2 turns of the pan
1 carrot, peeled and chopped into a small dice
1 medium yellow skinned onion, chopped
2 small ribs celery from the heart, chopped
3 cloves garlic, chopped
3 cups tomato sauce or one 14-ounce can plus one 8-ounce can
3 cups chicken stock, available in a box on the soup aisle



1 pound ground beef, pork, and veal mix (meatloaf mix), available at butcher counter
1/2 cup grated cheese, Parmigiano, or Romano, plus more to pass at table
1/2 cup Italian breadcrumbs, a few handfuls
1 large egg, beaten
2 tablespoons chopped parsley leaves
1/2-pound spaghetti, broken in half
1 cup basil leaves, torn or shredded

1 loaf Italian crusty bread, for dunking

Directions

- 1. Preheat a medium soup pot over medium heat. Add extra-virgin olive oil, 2 turns of the pan, carrots, onions, celery, garlic, and sauté 5 minutes. Add tomato sauce and stock and cover pot. Turn up heat and bring to a fast boil.
- 2. While soup comes to a boil, mix the ground meat with cheese, breadcrumbs, egg, and parsley. Roll into 1 1/2- to 2-inch balls.
- 3. Remove lid from soup and slide balls into soup. Bring back to a boil then stir in spaghetti. Reduce the heat and simmer soup 10 minutes more, until pasta is tender, and balls have cooked through. Stir in basil and remove "stoup" from the stove. Serve soup with bread and cheese.


