



Did You Know?

- That, the English term *Christmas* ("mass on Christ's day") is of fairly recent origin.
- That, the earlier term *Yule* may have derived from the Germanic *jōl* or the Anglo-Saxon *geōl*, which referred to the feast of the winter solstice.
- That, the corresponding terms in other languages—
 Navidad in Spanish, Natale in Italian, Noël in French—all probably denote "nativity."
- That, the German word Weihnachten denotes "hallowed night."
- That, the actual observance of the day of Jesus' birth was long in coming.
- That, during the first two centuries of Christianity there was strong opposition to recognizing birthdays of martyrs or, for that matter, of Jesus.
- That, numerous early Church Fathers offered sarcastic comments about "the pagan custom" of celebrating birthdays when, in fact, saints and martyrs should be honored on the days of their martyrdom—their true "birthdays," from the church's perspective.
- That, the precise origin of assigning December 25 as the birth date of Jesus is unclear.
- That, December 25 was first identified as the date of Jesus' birth by Sextus Julius Africanus in 221 and later became the universally accepted date.
- That, for a long time the celebration of Jesus' birth was observed in conjunction with his baptism, celebrated January 6.
- That, after December 25 had become widely accepted as the date of Jesus' birth, Christian writers frequently made the connection between the rebirth of the sun and the birth of the Son.
- That, every day at All Saints is sunny, warm, and bright!



The Season of Advent

Advent is a season observed in most Christian denominations as a time of expectant waiting and preparation for both the celebration of the Nativity of Christ at Christmas and the return of Christ at the Second Coming.

Advent is the beginning of the liturgical year in Western Christianity.

The name was adopted from Latin *adventus* "coming; arrival", translating Greek *parousia* from the Early Christian Writings, originally referring to the Second Coming.

The season of Advent in the Christian calendar anticipates the "coming of Christ" from three different perspectives: the physical nativity in Bethlehem, the reception of Christ in the heart of the believer, and the eschatological Second Coming.

Practices associated with Advent include Advent calendars, lighting an Advent wreath, praying an Advent daily devotional, erecting a Christmas tree or a Chrismon tree, lighting a Christingle, as well as other ways of preparing for Christmas, such as setting up Christmas decorations, sending Christmas cards to friends and family, and a custom that is sometimes done liturgically called the hanging of the greens ceremony.



An "all new" Canticle will be used on Sunday's and Wednesday's during Advent. It is entitled, "We are waiting for Jesus" and was written by John Helgen. Come and join us!

But I can tell you that I wholly support the Sunday School Children in their fund-raising





St. John, Apostle, and Evangelist

(Wednesday, December 27th)



St. John the Evangelist is traditionally identified as the author of the Gospel of John. Christians have traditionally associated him with John the Apostle, John of Patmos, and John the Presbyter, although this has been disputed by most modern scholars.

John the Evangelist is often referred to as the "disciple whom Jesus loved" in his own Gospel. He was one of the original twelve apostles and is traditionally believed to have been the youngest.

He survived all the other apostles.

John, along with his brothers James, and Peter, formed an informal circle of three disciples among the Twelve Apostles in the Gospels.

They were the only apostles present on three particular occasions during Jesus' public ministry: the Raising of Jairus' daughter, the Transfiguration of Jesus, and the Agony in the Garden of Gethsemane¹.

After Jesus' death, John, along with Peter and James the Just, were collectively recognized as the three Pillars of the Church.

He was also the one to whom Jesus gave the honor of caring for his mother, as John stood beneath the cross.

Due to the depth of his Gospel, John is often thought of as the eagle of theology, soaring in high regions that other writers did not enter.

It is the life of another saint that will be celebrated here in our midst! Come and join us on the Wednesday night, after Christmas!

With a namesake like ALL SAINTS, you have to remember all those who came before you!

MEMBER ENVELOPE INFORMATION



Saint Nicholas



Saint Nicholas Day, also called the Feast of Saint Nicholas, is observed on 5th or 6th of December in Western Christian countries, and on 19th of December in Eastern Christian countries using the old church Calendar, is the feast day of <u>Saint Nicholas of Myra</u>; it falls within the season of <u>Advent</u>. It is celebrated as a <u>Christian</u> festival with particular regard to Saint Nicholas' reputation as a bringer of gifts, as well as through the attendance of <u>church liturgies</u>.

The American <u>Santa Claus</u>, as well as the British <u>Father Christmas</u>, derive from Saint Nicholas. "Santa Claus" is itself derived in part from the Dutch <u>Sinterklaas</u>, the saint's name in that language. However, the gift-giving associated with these descendant figures is associated with <u>Christmas Day</u> rather than Saint Nicholas Day itself.

This year, December 6th falls on a Wednesday night...so come and join us as we gather to worship and celebrate the life of yet another saint of the church!

Who knows what gifts might be left behind for those in attendance that night!

St. Nicholas Day celebrates the life and legacy of a **4th-century bishop** who was known for his **kindness and generosity** to the poor and children.

After the <u>Reformation</u>, St. Nicholas was largely forgotten in <u>Protestant</u> Europe, although his memory was kept alive in <u>Holland</u> as Sinterklaas.

Lifeline Screening

Lifeline Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings, will offer affordable, non-invasive, and painless health screenings at All Saints Lutheran Church on Monday, February 5, 2024.

A package of four screenings to identify risk for stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions will be offered:

Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.

Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening

An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.

Atrial Fibrillation

A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, heart failure, and other heart-related complications. These 4 vital screenings take 60-90 minutes to complete. The Season of Christmas

And a glorious season it is! You do of course, know that Christmas is the shortest season of the church year. It is the second season of the church year, being preceded by Advent. The season of Christmas is 12 days in length. It was never meant to be a one-day, one-and-done kind of event. There is the "cultures" season of Christmas, and there is the "churches" season of Christmas. And there is a huge difference between the two. For a great many it is the hap-happiest season of all...but not for everyone. We need to be mindful and prayerful of those experiencing a different Christmas this year. A Christmas that will be evolving and will never be the same.



Christmas is that annual festival commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ, observed "primarily" on December 25 as a religious and cultural celebration among billions of people around the world.

A feast central to the Christian liturgical year, it follows the season of Advent and initiates the season of Christmastide, which historically in the West lasts twelve days and culminates on Twelfth Night.

The season that follows Christmas is the EPIPHANY SEASON.

Christmas Day is a "public holiday" in many countries, is celebrated "religiously" by a majority of Christians, as well as "culturally" by many non-Christians, and forms an integral part of the holiday season organized around it.

The traditional Christmas narrative recounted in the <u>Early</u> Christian Writings, known as the <u>Nativity of Jesus</u>, says that Jesus was born in <u>Bethlehem</u>, in accordance with <u>messianic prophecies</u>.

When <u>Joseph</u> and <u>Mary</u> arrived in the city, the inn had no room and so they were offered a stable where the <u>Christ Child</u> was soon born, with <u>angels</u> proclaiming this news to <u>shepherds</u> who then spread the word.

To reread the Christmas story, turn to Luke, chapter 2. You will be glad you did!

Have children or grandchildren, include them in your reading of the WORD!

Cooking for the Holidays

PERFECT RIB ROAST

INGREDIENTS

- 1 standing rib roast (about 1/2 pound per person)
- 1 tbsp. kosher salt
- 2 tsp. black pepper
- 1 bunch fresh rosemary



DIRECTIONS

Remove rib roast from packaging and place in a roasting pan. Let come to room temperature for about 30 minutes. Preheat oven to 450°.

Generously cover all sides of rib roast with salt and pepper. Place roast in a roasting pan fat-side up. Arrange half the rosemary in the bottom of the pan around the roast.

Roast 30 minutes, then reduce heat to 350° and cook 1 hour 30 minutes more for medium rare. (Plan on about 15 minutes per pound.)

Remove roast from oven, cover with foil, and let rest for 20 minutes.

To serve, slice along ribs to remove them, then separate each rib and put them aside. Slice the roast crossways against the grain. Serve on a platter with the ribs and remaining half fresh rosemary.

You are aware and know that for the past year a committee has been meeting and reviewing and going over line-by-line, and word-by-word on recommended constitutions for congregational use. Our current constitution was ratified in 2008. Since that time, the church has made many, many changes to what is our "current constitution." The Synod has asked congregations to update their constitutions. We were set and ready to do that when the Pandemic hit.

We looked at the 2016 Constitution. The 2019 Constitution. And now, we are ready to propose a 2024 Constitution to be the next constitution governing the actions of All Saints going forward. The constitution must be in your hands 30 days prior to the ANNUAL MEETING. E copies are permissible to send out, but hard copies must also be made available upon request.

At the November meeting of the Church Council, it was recommended that we present the 2024 ELCA Approved Constitution to the congregation for voting on. Once accepted by the congregation it will be submitted to the Synod for their final approval and the process will come to an end.

MAKE SURE WE HAVE YOUR CURRENT EMAIL ADDRESS, MAKE SURE WE HAVE IT CORRECTLY WRITTEN. A new constitution governing our church is coming your way!

Membership Requirements

One more time, before years end, we want you to know and to understand that to be a member in "good standing" of All Saints Lutheran Church, you must either receive Communion at least once during the previous year (filling out a communion slip) "OR" you must make a monetary gift to the church (during the previous year) that is recorded with your name attached to it.

To vote at an ANNUAL MEETING, you must do BOTH, you have to give an offering that is recorded with your name attached to it AND you MUST take communion on at least one occasion during the previous year (filling out a communion slip.)

Failure to follow these requirements removes one's name to inactive status in the life of the church.

Baking for the Holidays

World's Best Fruit Cake

YIELD: 2 (8 X 4 INCH) LOAF CAKES

PREP: 1 DAY

COOK: 1 HOUR 30 MINUTES

ADDITIONAL TIME: 30 MINUTES

TOTAL: 1 DAY 2 HOURS

A traditional moist fruit cake made with rum-soaked dried fruit, citrus zest, and candied ginger.

The best fruit cake recipe you'll ever make! It turns cynics into converts. This fruit cake recipe yields two (8 x 4-inch) loaf cakes. Wrap in sherry or triple sec-soaked cheesecloth for at least a week for the



best flavor!

Soaked Fruit Mixture:

- 1¼ cups (200 g) dark raisins
- 1¼ cups (200 g) golden raisins
- 2 cups (320 g) mixed unsweetened dried fruit, chopped
- 1 cup (160 g) dried unsweetened black figs chopped
- 1 cup (160 g) dried unsweetened tart cherries chopped
- ¾ cup (120 g) dried unsweetened prunes chopped
- ¾ cup (6 oz; 180 mL) dark rum

Fruit Cake Ingredients:

- 1½ cups (180 g) unbleached all-purpose flour
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- ¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon Diamond Crystal kosher salt
- 1 stick (4 oz; 115 g) unsalted butter softened





Fruit Cake Ingredients: (continued)


- ¾ cup (160 g) packed light brown sugar
- 5 large eggs room temperature
- 1 tablespoon freshly grated lemon zest
- 1 tablespoon freshly grated orange zest
- ½ cup (120 mL) freshly squeezed orange juice
- 1 Granny Smith apple peeled and coarsely grated
- ¾ cup (90 g) slivered almonds (or chopped pecans or walnuts)
- **3** tablespoons (36 g) finely diced crystallized ginger
- one batch-soaked fruit mixture see above
- ¾ cup (100 g) chopped bittersweet chocolate or dark chocolate chips optional

For Storage:

medium sherry or triple sec for soaking

Instructions

 The Day Before Baking: Combine the dried fruit in a large mixing bowl. Add the dark rum, cover, and allow the mixture to soak at room temperature for a minimum of 12 hours, or ideally 24 hours prior to preparing the fruit cake batter.



Equipment Note: This fruitcake can also be prepared using 9x5-inch loaf pans. If using other types of pans, lightly grease and line with parchment paper.

- In a medium mixing bowl, whisk together the all-purpose flour, baking powder, spices, and salt. Set it aside.
- In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with a paddle attachment, cream the softened butter and light brown sugar together over medium-high speed for 3 minutes, or until light and fluffy. Reduce speed to medium and add the eggs one at a time, beating just until each egg is incorporated. The mixture will look slightly broken, that's ok.
- Over low speed, slowly add the flour mixture until just absorbed. Remove the bowl from the stand
 mixer. Add the lemon zest, orange zest, fresh orange juice, grated apple, slivered almonds, diced
 candied ginger, soaked dried fruit mixture (along with any liquid if it hasn't already been absorbed),
 and chocolate (if using).



Stir mixture with a large spatula, scraping the edges and bottom of the bowl several times, until all of the ingredients are evenly incorporated. It is a very thick, fruit heavy mixture.

- Transfer and divide the batter evenly among the loaf pans. Use an offset spatula to smooth the batter into an even layer. Set the loaf pans on the center rack, several inches apart from one another. Bake for 1 hour and 15 minutes to 1 hour and 30 minutes, rotating the pans halfway, or until the cakes have set. Remove from the oven and place on a rack to cool completely before removing from the pans.
- Storing and Aging: Once the cake has cooled, carefully remove the cakes from the loaf pans and set upright. Soak two large pieces of cheesecloth in medium sherry or triple sec (*they should be lightly damp, not soaking wet when you wrap the cakes, so you may need to squeeze out any excess liquor). Wrap each cake tightly. Cover loafs with wax paper and foil before transferring to a large Ziploc bag. Store in the refrigerator for up to 6 to 8 weeks (it can often last even longer). You can serve this cake right after it has cooled, but the flavors improve greatly with time (I recommend several days or up to a week, at minimum). Unwrap and re-soak the cheesecloth once a week.



For Garnishing: If desired, you can top the fruitcake with a light apricot glaze and whole pecans before serving.

Serving Notes: Slice fruit cake with a serrated knife. Serve on its own or spread with a small amount of salted butter.




He said, 'Father, have you been drinking?'
