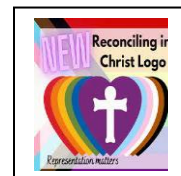

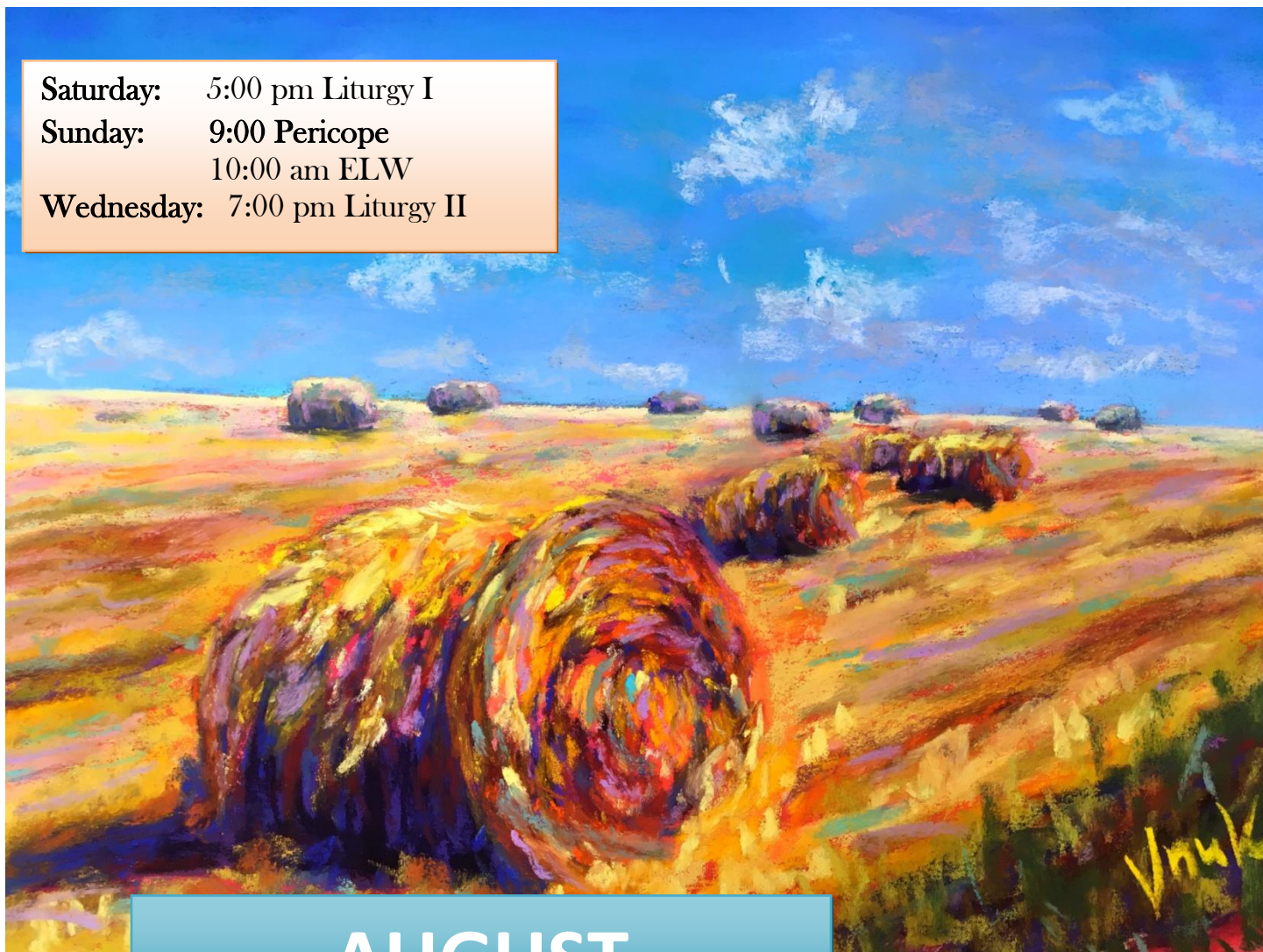

See you in worship!

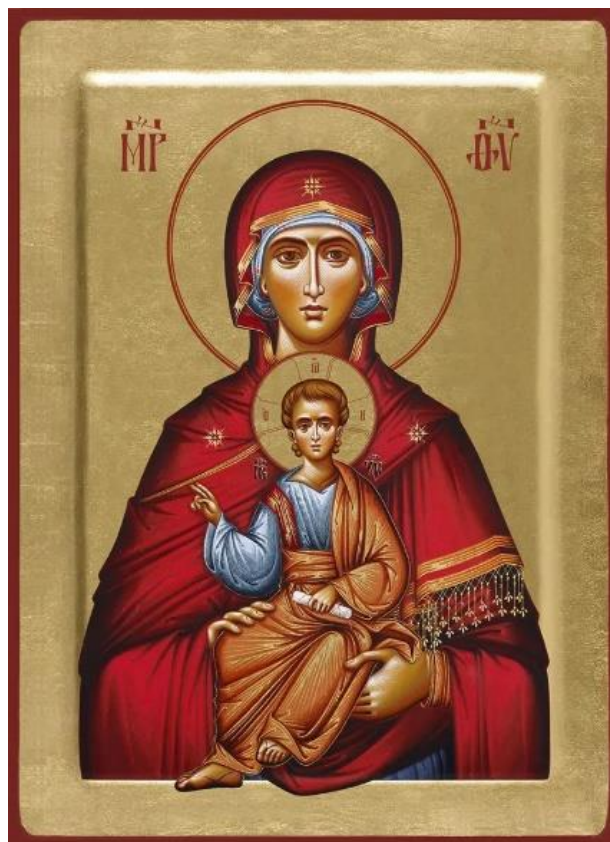

Mary, Mother of Our Lord

(August 15th of Every year!)



The synoptic Gospels name Mary as the mother of Jesus.

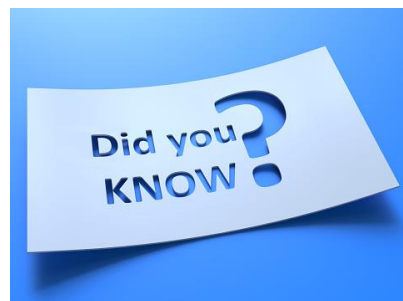
The gospels of Matthew and Luke describe Mary as a virgin who was chosen by God to conceive Jesus through the Holy Spirit.

After giving birth to Jesus in Bethlehem, she raised him in the city of Nazareth in Galilee and was in Jerusalem at his crucifixion and with the apostles after his ascension.

Although her later life is not accounted for in the Bible, Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, and some Protestant traditions believe that her body was raised into heaven at the end of her earthly life, which is known in Western Christianity as the Assumption of Mary and in Eastern Christianity as the Dormition of the Mother of God.

Mary has been venerated since early Christianity and is often considered to be the holiest and greatest saint.

Protestant views on Mary vary, with some holding her to have “lesser status.”



Did You Know?

- While the Early Christian Writings do not include many details about Mary's personal life, we can probably assume that, at this point, she was a young woman (what the ancients considered a young woman would be more like a teenager in modern terms) who lived with her parents and maybe siblings. When the gospels introduce Mary, no family members besides Elizabeth are discussed, but John 19.25 suggests that she may have had a sister.
- John 19.25, "Meanwhile standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene."
- Mary traveled a lot more than other women of her day and time. In Luke 1. 39, she went to the country of Judah to visit her relative, Elizabeth.
- Then, she had to go to Bethlehem because Joseph's ancestors were from Bethlehem.
- She, Joseph, and the child fled and lived in Egypt for a while to escape King Herod.
- Finally, they moved back, and Mary raised Jesus in her hometown of Nazareth. (See Matthew 2. 23.)
- The prayer – "Hail Mary" is one of the most loved Marian prayers. The portion of the response that says, "Holy Mary, Mother of God, was based on the words of Elizabeth (Mother of John, the Baptizer.) See Luke 1. 42-43, "Elizabeth cried out in a loud voice and said, "Most blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb. How does this happen to me, that the mother of My Lord, should come to me?"
- Now you know...

Did You Know?

Bartholomew, Apostle

(August 24th, every year!)

Bartholomew was one of the 12 main disciples of Jesus Christ.

In the entire Early Christian Writings, his name **only** appears in the four lists of the twelve apostles (Matthew 10:2–4, Mark 3:16–19, Luke 6:14–16, Acts 1:1–13). You can check it out for yourself!

He's never given any distinguishing qualities or titles, so aside from his name, we know almost nothing about him...

Known as “the apostles” or “ones who were sent,” Bartholomew and the other disciples witnessed Jesus’ ministry for about three years...

After Jesus’ death, they began the movement which became known as Christianity.

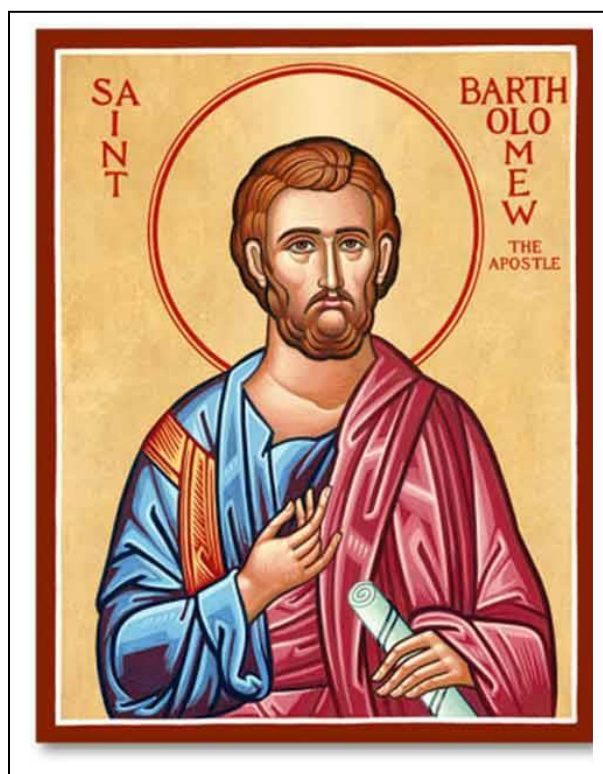
This makes Bartholomew one of “the most important and authoritative leaders of the early church,” he likely helped spread the gospel to particular regions during the first century—but he’s never explicitly mentioned or singled out in any of the epistles...

The name “Bartholomew” most likely comes from Aramaic (*Bar-Talmai*), meaning “son of Talmai.”

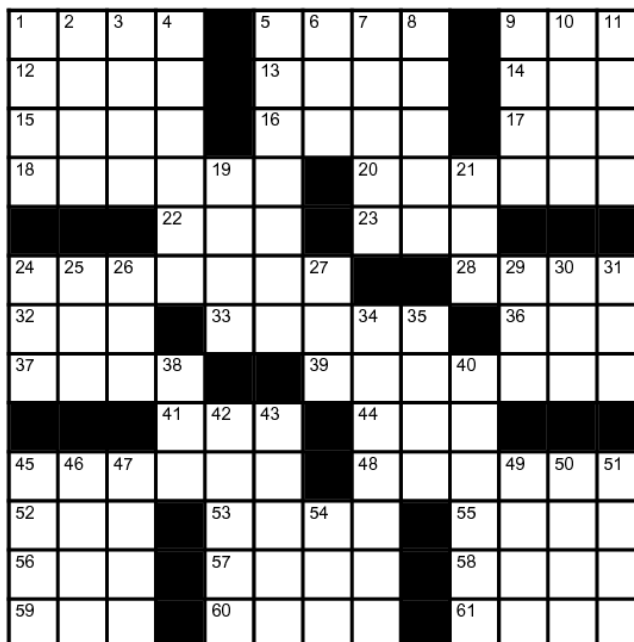

Robin is a schoolteacher, teaching in Racine.

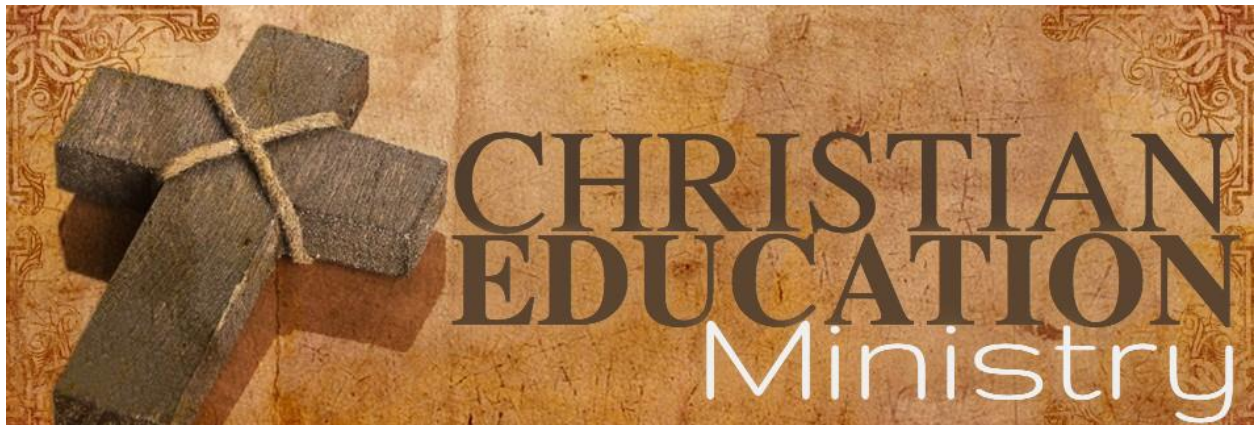
Just an interesting fact, we presently have four individuals with strong educational backgrounds all working and serving on the church council. How cool is that?

Liturgy Committee –

New Banners

A series of new banners were recently purchased with monies coming from the Memorial Fund of the church. Memorial monies are usually received when someone passes away and monies are given in their memory. Those monies are not touched often and are allowed to accrue over time. And when they are utilized, it is usually for something visible to the congregation. Something worship-liturgy related. Some of our present banners, while still in good shape,

have been used for 20-plus years and longer.

A recent addition was a new baptismal banner. A lot of the banners that we have were purchased in memory of loved ones. They are not discarded or replaced. Instead, we are simply adding to what we currently have.

We still have some “holes” in our liturgical year. Celebrations that are but one day in length have always been a little problematic. For example: Reformation Day is always celebrated on October 31st. That is, it. The color is red. This is the day that the church sees as the beginning of the Reformation process. Individual banners can be very expensive. The good ones, meaning the better-quality ones are of greater cost.

Because of our namesake, “ALL SAINTS” we do tend to celebrate the various saint days when they fall on a day of worship. Banners for individual saints are far and few in between.

You will also find a new seasonal banner for the season of Pentecost; therefore, the color is green, hanging in the narthex area. We hope you enjoy these newest additions.

Memorial (Box) Shelf And Memorial Candle

We apologize. We are not always good at keeping the congregation informed. In the narthex, the area beyond the entranceway...you will see a MEMORIAL (Box) SHELF made out of oak, hanging on the wall. Above it is the MEMORIAL CANDLE, that is usually lit in memory of a loved one who has passed away. The Memorial Box (Shelf) is for memorial money, memorializing, honoring, and remembering those who have died. You will find envelopes right there on the shelf for that purpose. That Memorial Box was made by our very own, Randy Meier, many, many years ago. Now you are in the loop!

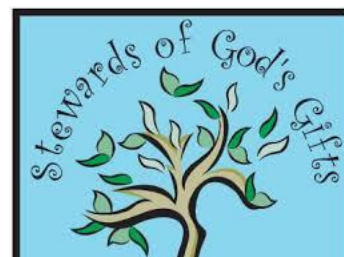

"Dear Lord, please don't let me be late... But please don't shove me either!"

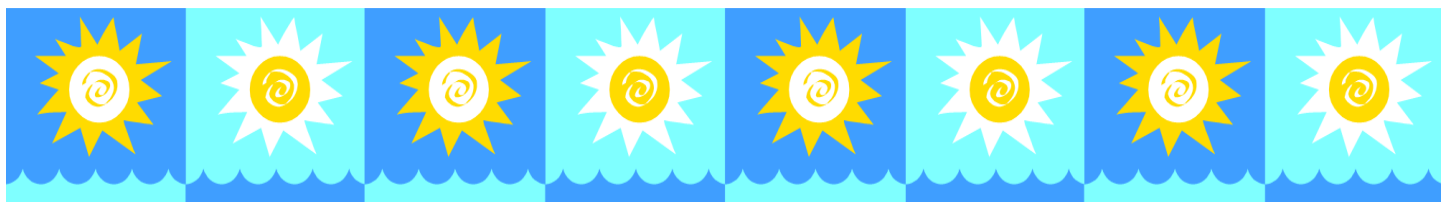
