Comment Article: "Gearing up for Lent"

The fourth season of the church's liturgical year will soon be upon us: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, and soon, the Season of Lent.

Lent is a time of introspection.

Lent is a time to examine our lives closely—the good, the bad, and the not-so-pretty parts... Are we "talking the talk" and "walking the walk" or merely "going through the motions?" You know, just "spinning our wheels?"

Or are we even "going through the motions," at all?

Lent has always been seen as a journey that is renewed every year. They say that every journey begins with one step. Will you take that one step this Lenten Season?

Lent is a blessed time when we can slow down and actively reflect on our spiritual journey. Go ahead and tell me, what is more important...what is more pressing...

We are called to examine "our hearts and minds," our whole lives in respect to our God.

Lent reminds us that this is the season "to turn away" from our worldly distractions and "to journey home" to God.

God is waiting for you; you know he is...

Lent has always been that season of the church year, when we hear the words, "Return to the Lord, your God."

They echo...across the centuries...

They echo through the darkness of the night...

They echo in our sleeping hours...

Beginning on Ash Wednesday, (which is just around the corner!) Christians are called to use the season of Lent to examine our relationship with God as they prepare for the next season of the church year, that being, Easter. The Season of Resurrection joy....

The holy season of Lent commences with black ashes on the forehead in preparation to celebrate "the mystery of the cross."

Lent lasts 40 days so that we can spend "the right amount of time" in this period of seeking forgiveness and preparation for Easter.

The period of 40 days represents a period of "preparation or testing."

The number 40 has special significance in the Bible. It was the number of days water flooded the earth, the years Israel wandered in the desert and the days Jesus fasted in the desert.

So, we take these 40 days to enter into preparation "for the new life God has waiting for us."

We contemplate how Christ gives us hope, forgiveness, and new life, through the cross and through his gracious mercy.

Lent is also a time to find out HOW to get closer to God. Closer to his Son. How to RETURN to HIM. Sometimes we wander. Sometimes we allow there to be a distance between God and ourselves.

Sometimes we turn our backs on him

Sometimes we run in the opposite direction.

Sometimes we just become lazy.

Sometimes we leave Him in our past.

The season of Lent is a time to grow in our relationship with God and his Christ through increased prayer, acts of charity, almsgiving, and fasting.

Those have always been considered to be the chief pillars of the season of Lent.

It's a special season for healing and restoring our relationship with God and with his son, and prayerfully with others...as well.

I pray you have a blessed Lenten journey. See you in church! Pr. Mortenson


The Church Council will be installed on Sunday, February 9th at 10 a.m. at our Sunday liturgy of worship.

Council Capsules

Council approved the following matters at the January council meeting.:

- Council approved new members Alana Zielesch and Roman Michalski
- Council approved extending the food pantry hours to two Saturdays a month from 12-2 pm beginning in March.
- Council agreed to present to the congregation a proposal to reduce the number of liturgies each week from three to two, eliminating Wednesdays except at special liturgical seasons as discussed with the liturgy committee and the pastor.
- Council approved the youth group hosting Easter breakfast.

Congregational Annual Meeting Recap

- Council changes The congregation approved the appointment of Barb Schrubey to Treasurer, Sue McIntosh to Financial Secretary and Lisa Wytrykus Kleppek to Council Secretary. There were five council positions and 3 of them were filled by Robin Schmidt, Dan Thein and Sandy Montague. At the close of the meeting there are still two vacant positions on council.
- The congregation approved a \$245,637 budget for 2025 that includes a 3% raise for the employees.
- There were no volunteers for the synod assembly in May.
- The congregation approved a motion to eliminate the weekly Wednesday liturgies except for special seasonal liturgies at the discretion of the liturgy committee.

Valentine's Day



"Love, love, love, that's what it's all about, cause God loves us, we love each other ... "

The history of Valentine's Day—and the story of its patron saint—is shrouded in mystery. We do know that February has long been celebrated as a month of romance and that St. Valentine's Day, as we know it today, contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman traditions. But who was Saint Valentine, and how did he become associated with this ancient rite?

The history of Valentine's Day recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred.

One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death.

Still others insist that it was Saint Valentine of Terni, a bishop, who was the true namesake of the holiday. He, too, was beheaded by Claudius II outside Rome.

Other stories suggest that Valentine may have been killed for attempting to help Christians escape harsh Roman prisons, where they were often beaten and tortured.

According to one legend, an imprisoned Valentine sent the first "valentine" greeting himself after he fell in love with a young girl—possibly his jailor's daughter—who visited him during his confinement. Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her a letter signed "From your Valentine," an expression that is still in use today.

Although the truth behind the Valentine legends is murky, the stories all emphasize his appeal as a sympathetic, heroic, and—most importantly—romantic figure. By the Middle Ages, perhaps thanks to this reputation, Valentine would become one of the most popular saints in England and France. So, who is your Valentine?

Offering Envelope Update!

For those church members using envelopes, if you need more envelopes, there is a sign-up sheet on the bulletin board leading into the Fellowship Hall.

Just put your name down along with your member's number (the envelope number if you can remember it.)

You will receive your box of envelopes in about a week to 10 days. Your envelopes will be on the table in the narthex, leading into the church.

Also, if you are using envelopes, please use up ALL YOUR ENVELOPES. Use the "SPECIAL OFFERING" envelopes, all the Christmas, Advent, Lent, etc., envelopes. Your offering is recorded just that way. There are NO DATES on any of your envelopes so if you miss church for a few weeks, just use ONE envelope (instead of five, eight, or more) to get caught up.

You also do not have to put a date on your envelopes because the money counters only record OFFERINGS on Sunday and your offering is recorded for that day (SUNDAY.)

I finally read about "my breed." You know, it makes a lot of sense. I found it fascinating. I am not blowing my own horn at all but just thought you might find some of the following to be of interest.

Airedales are known for:

- Highly Intelligent
- Versatility
- Inquisitiveness
- STRONG Protective Instincts
- A Lively Spirit

I bet you didn't know that we are also called BINGLET TERRIERS or WATERSIDE TERRIERS.

We were actually named for the area of our origin in England. They say we originated in the valley of DALE of the River AIRE, in the West Riding of Yorkshire, England. And therefore, our breed name is Airedale. We are the largest of the terriers and are called the KING of the TERRIERS.

What a lot of people do not know is that we were originally bred as a hunting dog and as an allaround working farm dog, especially where vermin control was necessary.

The Airedale was extensively used in World War I to carry messages to soldiers behind enemy lines and transport mail.

They were also used by the RED CROSS to find wounded soldiers on the battlefield.

There are numerous tales of Airedales delivering their messages despite terrible injury.


An Airedale named "Jack" ran through half a mile of enemy fire, with a message attached to his collar. He arrived at headquarters with his jaw broken and one leg badly splintered, and right after he delivered the message, he dropped dead in front of its recipient.

The Souper Bowl Of Caring



- 1 tsp cloves
- 1 tsp cinnamon

For Frosting

- 8 oz cream cheese
- 1 lb. powdered sugar
- ¼ cup butter
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- ½ black walnuts

Directions:

Mix sugar, eggs, oil, and grated carrots. Sift dry ingredients together and add to the wet mixture. Spread the batter in a greased pan.

Bake for 1 hour in a 350 degrees oven.

Cream together the cream cheese, butter, powdered sugar, and vanilla.

Spread over the cooled cake and decorate with crushed walnuts along the sides and the top. Enjoy!




