Comment Article:

What was the culminating event that led to the arrest and crucifixion of Jesus? It is a good question, isn't it? You may disagree with me. Feel free...

What was the last straw for the religious authorities that moved them to make good on their threat to actually go out and capture Jesus, and to finally do something about him?

In Mark, Matthew, and Luke (you remember, called the SYNOPTICS) because they are so SIMILAR, it was the cleansing of the Temple, that moment when Jesus walked into the Temple and threw out all the merchants and the money changers because commerce was becoming more important than prayer. That REALLY made them angry. It was financial.

It is almost a holy moment. A reverent moment. A sacred moment. Really, truly, a cleansing...

In John's Gospel, it was when Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead. You don't do that!

It was such an astounding miracle that the religious authorities were terrified this marvel would make Jesus so popular that, as John writes, "If we let him go on like this, everyone will believe in him, and the Romans will come and destroy both our holy place and our nation."

Now why would the Romans care about some itinerant backwoods Jewish preacher and miracle worker?

If he became "too popular" the people might proclaim him as "the Messiah" and the prophesied Messiah was supposed to be a great military leader who would rally the people, start a war, and liberate Israel from their Roman occupation.

If Jesus started that kind of uprising, Caiaphas feared how Rome might retaliate, so he decided that it was better for Jesus to die than for the whole country to suffer. The Sanhedrin, or council of elders, concurred.

It was a political game. A sacrifice of sorts, but that is John's take on it...

I personally think the crowds had something to do with it, too. They were a threat. The growing numbers. The constant flow of people surrounding him.

They needed him, they hoped in him. They thought he might be the one. He needed them, too, to get his message out. They kind of needed each other.

The miracles or the signs, if you will, further singled him out...and not necessarily in a good way. Like him or love him, or despise him, some thought he was a potential threat and his followers along with him. All of them were a part of the process...the plan, if you will.

Crowds can be fickle. We know that. They love you today, and tomorrow they are screaming, "Crucify him, crucify him." I am certain, Jesus knew that too! It did not deter him. Nothing did.

You know, they say, it is the greatest story ever told. I believe that.

Everything he did, he did, for us, for you, and me. He did it for us, all of us, without exception...it was the way of love. And his love was given to all.

MIDWEEK LENTEN WORSHIP...


(It is going to be special for so many reasons!)






Did You Know?

- In the Roman world "flagellation" was often used as a prelude to crucifixion, and in this context is sometimes referred to as "scouring" or "the scourge."
- Most famously according to the gospel accounts, Jesus also underwent scourging.
- Due to the context of the flagellation of Jesus, the method and extent may have been limited by local practice, though it was done under Roman law.
- Whips with small pieces of metal or bone at the tips were commonly used.
- Such a device could easily cause disfigurement and serious trauma, such as ripping pieces of flesh from the body or loss of an eye.
- In addition to causing severe pain, the victim would approach a state of hypovolemic shock due to loss of blood.
- The Romans reserved this treatment for non-citizens, as stated in the *lex Porcia* and *lex Sempronia*, dating from 195, and 123 BCE.
- The poet, HORACE refers to the *horrible flagellum* (horrible whip) in his *Satires*.
- Typically, the one to be punished was stripped naked and bound to a low pillar so that he could bend over it or be chained to an upright pillar to be stretched out, the latter being the preferred method.
- Two lictors, (some reports indicate Scourging with four or six lictors) alternate blows from the bare shoulders down the body to the soles of the feet.
- There was no limit to the number of blows inflicted—this was left to the lictors to decide, though they were normally not supposed to kill the victim.
- The Jews specified no more than 39 lashings, but the Romans knew no such number.

After the Annual Meeting, there have been quite a few members who have signed up with RaiseRight to download their mobile app to their phone to purchase electronic gift cards. For those of you who are great at setting up apps on your phones, stop at the gift card table for instructions on how to register your electronic gift cards and add funds to your electronic gift cards. You'll need the enrollment code which is listed on the form. Just follow the instructions and you'll be all set.

Also, we do have zero-balance cards for Pick'nSave, Amazon, Starbucks, Walmart and Target. These cards have no value on them. It's up to you to activate them and add funds. If you're interested, just ask one of the gift card sellers for the zero-balance cards. Remember: there's no value on them until you load a value on them.

And - again, if you have any questions about how the gift card program works here at All Saints, just stop at the gift card table before or after each liturgy. We're always happy to help...

Lookin' Ahead!

We know many parents like to plan things out ahead of time and not wait until the last minute. So, we looked ahead for you a little bit...

First Communion Classes for Spring of 2025 will be here before we know it.

In looking at the calendar – FIRST COMMUNION WILL BE HELD on Pentecost Sunday, June 8th, 2025 at 10:00 in the morning.

We have a little bit of play with the class dates: Monday, May 25th is Memorial Day. Some families take advantage of the time and are out of town on that weekend. In that case: we could hold classes on May 10th, May 17th, (skip the weekend for Memorial Day) and hold classes on May 31st and June 7th.

We will let the parents decide what works best for them.

We have four classes. Four weeks. A Parent or Guardian must be in attendance. Classes are each 45 minutes in length. Classes normally run from 11:00-11:45 on Saturdays. And, we celebrate on JUNE 8^{TH} ...THE CLASS TIME IN BETWEEN WE CAN PLAY WITH...(If Parents, so wanted we could hold classes on the 17^{th} , 24^{th} , 31^{st} , and 7^{th}) We are open.

Let us know your preference when you sign your young person up for classes. They must be seven years of age or older. Let's do this! It will be awesome.



The Crown of Thorns (A little bit of history that actually is more current!)

According to the Early Christian Writings, a woven crown of thorns was placed on the head of Jesus during the passion and leading up to his crucifixion. It was one of the ways, employed by Jesus' captors both to cause him pain and to mock him as being THE KING OF THE JEWS.

It is mentioned in the gospels of MARK, MATTHEW, and JOHN. Only Luke does not allude to it...

It is often referred to by the early Church Fathers, such as Clement of Alexandria and Origen and others, along with being referenced in the APOCRYPHA in the Gospel according to Peter.

A purported relic of the Crown of Thorns was received by Louis XIV of France... It went from the hands of Baldwin II of Constantinople to the French King and Emperor. It was kept in the Notre Dame de Paris, France. On 15 April 2019, it was rescued from "the great fire of Notre Dame" and was moved to the Louvre Museum where it was kept for safe keeping...On 12 December 2024, a ceremony marking its return to Notre Dame Cathedral was led by a procession attended by members of the Order of the Holy Sepulcher...

The Holy Relic was preserved.

RaiseRight raises money for All Saints!

You probably see the gift card table when you are at church and think, "I should buy some gift cards but I never carry my checkbook with me." Or you buy some gift cards but then forget to use them or misplace them. While as the announcements always say "Buying gift cards helps out your church", RaiseRight has made it incredibly easy for you to do it right from the convenience of your phone!

With the RaiseRight app you can purchase physical gift cards (some are reloadable) as well as eGift cards that you can either enter into a merchant site or just use directly from your phone. There are currently over 430 retailers on the app and nearly all of those offer an eGift card so you never have to deal with a physical gift card. If you prefer to have a physical card, there are nearly 150 of the retailers who offer reloadable cards that can be repeatedly reloaded. Some cards are shipped to the gift card coordinator (Barb Schrubey) for free but some can be shipped directly to you (for a small fee).

Each card purchase earns a percentage of the value of the card for All Saints (it doesn't subtract from the value of the card you purchase) and with special offerings, sometimes those bonuses can really add up. At the time of the writing of this article, RaiseRight was offering a bonus of 15% on Kwik Trip Grocery Cards and 9% on Kwik Trip Gas cards.

By spending \$200.29, I was able to earn \$24 for church! Please note that by using the app, you will be charged a small fee depending on the payment method you choose. By connecting a bank account to the secure site, the fee is minimal (currently \$0.29). If you would prefer to connect a debit card, the card is 1% and a credit card will charge a 3% fee.

A couple of examples of the ways I use the cards:

- I buy eGift Amazon cards (which are only a 1.6% earning but it's better than nothing, right?) and load the eGift card codes into my account. I set up my account to take first from the gift card balance and when I notice it getting low, I buy a couple more!
- I also do most of my grocery shopping at Meijer so each month, I buy a certain amount on an
 eGift card and save it right in my RaiseRight wallet. When I check out at Meijer, I scan the
 barcode right in my RaiseRight app and I am on my way!
- With 4 pets, I get auto shipments from Chewy Knowing how much I will spend, I purchase eGift cards, load them into my Chewy account which is set to draw first from the gift card balance and without really having to think about it, I am earning 5% of my pet budget for church!

RaiseRight also recently started offering a "Shop Online" link to directly make your purchases through the app (and not buy gift cards) and earn a percentage for the church. There are over 575 retailers listed and while the earnings percentages don't seem as large (e.g. 2% direct vs 5% with an eGift card), it is an option if you would prefer not to buy a gift card.

These purchases can be made on a computer as well as a smart phone. I would ask everyone reading this to consider downloading the app or look it up on your computer. Then I would challenge everyone to purchase either an eGift card or a physical card. Just an example of what we could do, if 50 people each bought just \$100 in a gift card that earned 3%, that would earn \$150 for the church. If each one of those people did that every month for a year, that would be \$1800 in profit! And it would just grow from there!



Conflict in the Garden

The Garden of Gethsemane is an actual garden area located at the foot of the Mount of Olives in East Jerusalem.

According to the four gospels (Mark, Matthew, Luke, and John), Jesus underwent great agony there in the garden, where he would be arrested before his actual crucifixion.

This garden area was a place of great importance to Jesus.

It is referred to in all four gospel accounts.

It is the place where Jesus would routinely retreat for times of prayer.

According to the BOOK OF ACTS OF THE APOSTLES, it is also in this vicinity that Jesus ascended into heaven.

This took place on the 40th day after the Resurrection from the dead.

So, Jesus is in agony. His disciples will not stay and watch with him for even one hour. Judas will lead soldiers to this area so that Jesus will be "handed over." He is handed over, with a kiss of betrayal...by one of his own.

60 Years Old!

It is unbelievable to me, that this was ten years ago already...**All Saints is about to turn 60 years old**. And it is in honor of that date that I share the following with you...

February 2015

To say I have a long history with All Saints, I suppose, would be putting it mildly!

I was nine years old in 1965 when **Rev. Ray Stubbe** walked through our neighborhood (Griffin Avenue and Verdev Avenue area) knocking on doors. He was asking if there would be support for a Lutheran Church in the area. After much consideration, my parents, Marvin and Lois Arsand decided that this was a great idea. We were at that time members of Unity Lutheran Church on Oklahoma Avenue. My parents, along with my sister Gail and I were joined with fellow neighborhood families – **SCHOLLS, WITTKES, FROELICHS, FORDS**, and **HENDRICKSONS**. At that time, Richard Scholl was the President of the **MARINE BANK** and my mom, Lois was the office manager. They helped facilitate the church meeting in the basement of the bank. This was at the corner of **Howell Avenue and Puetz Road**. We met at that location until we moved into our church building in **1969**.

In the fifty years since, **All Saints** has been a constant presence in my life. There have been many joyous events including, my **Confirmation** by **Rev. (Larry) Sandin**, my marriage, by **Rev. (Dave) Morton** and the Baptisms and Confirmations of my three children, all by **Rev. Jas A. Mortenson**. There has also been the sorrow of funerals for my father, Marvin Arsand, Great-Aunt, Irene Ballbach, Grandmother, Marie Nelson, sister, Gail Arsand-Voss and my mom, Lois Arsand. Thanks to the love and support of my **All Saints' Family**, I made it through it all.

The hall which is often referred to as Fellowship Hall is actually named **Ballbach Hall**. It's named after my Great-Aunt Irene Ballbach. Her generous donation upon her death helped facilitate and expedite the building of the hall. The name plate located above the Hall's doorway was crafted by Marion Docter's late husband, Gordon. Anyone can drape a cross like this...But can you cover it entirely, so it is no longer almost visible...

Can you imagine the JOY on EASTER MORNING when the cross returns, after not having seen it for six whole weeks...

Shrouding of the cross has been historic in the life of the church...

Covering it up...Hiding it...Changing it in its appearance...The Latin Cross, widely recognized around the world, has deep roots in religious and cultural history, dating back to early Christianity.

Different from the Greek cross with arms of equal length, the Latin Cross has a longer vertical arm, a design dominant in Western Christianity. It's believed to represent the cross where Jesus Christ was crucified, making it central to the Christian faith.

The cross became a common Christian symbol in the 4th century after Christianity was legalized in the Roman Empire by Emperor Constantine the Great.

Before this, early Christians used symbols like the Ichthys (fish) or the Chi-Rho. The cross's transformation from an execution method to a revered faith symbol marked a major change in Christian symbols.

The Latin Cross began appearing in architecture, art, personal ornaments, and manuscripts, symbolizing salvation and Christ's sacrifice.

The cross that is upfront in the center of our sanctuary is a Latin Cross...it is also called a crux immissae...or immissa.


