



Did You Know?

(All About the New Liturgical Year)

First of all, each of the three years is dedicated to a different **Gospel**.

- Year A Gospel of St. Matthew
- Year B Gospel of St. Mark
- Year C Gospel of St. Luke

The Gospel of St. John is typically used for saint days, special occasions, and during Holy Week, and the shorter Gospel of Mark is usually supplemented with readings from Matthew and Luke in Year B.

Run, this is a "math warning"...I know, no one told you there would be math, but guess what? There is... (Run or read on 😉)

One of the simplest ways to determine the cycle year is to **add the digits** of the calendar year and see if they are **divisible by three**. If it is divisible by three, then it is "**Year C**." Once you figure that out, the rest of the years are easy to determine.

Take the year 2025, for example:

2+0+2+5=9, and yes, 9 is divisible by 3. So, the year 2025 **follows the year of Luke**. Which is exactly what we have done. That means that the following year, 2026 (which equals 10), is going to be Matthew's gospel. Mark's gospel will follow the year after that. Then, back again, to Luke

The three years always change with the new year. So, every year in ADVENT is when the switch occurs. Starting with this Advent, we will make the change, as we have done every year for the last 59 years of our existence.

So, expect "the year of Matthew" starting with Advent and going forward...should you look at page 18ff. in the RED HYMNAL, you will find all of the proper lessons and the proper prayers for the day.

How has Thrivent helped All Saints???

Thrivent is a new name for an old friend. The Aid Association for Lutherans was the former name that many of us knew. Yes, Thrivent is an insurance and investment company, but their outlook is to "Thrive" as their members thrive and to share that with their members using Thrivent Action Teams.

Formerly, their sharing took the following routes: They provided gallons of milk to our church World Concerns committee, which in turn took those gallons to serve at St. Vincent DePaul meals.

About 15 years (or so) ago, they made a change to their form of sharing and instituted "Thrivent Action Teams". Thrivent members could apply to run an action team and receive up to \$250.00 and event supplies such as t-shirts.

All Saints members (who are eligible Thrivent members) can apply for an action team and receive the \$250.00 and supplies

Have a blessed Thanksgiving, everyone!

I'd venture to say, you probably never heard this before...

Plymouth's Thanksgiving began with a few colonists going out "fowling," possibly for turkeys but more probably for the easier prey of geese and ducks, since they "in one day killed as much as...served the company almost a week."

Next, 90 or so Wampanoag made a surprise appearance at the settlement's gate, doubtlessly unnerving the 50 or so colonists.

Nevertheless, over the next few days, the two groups socialized without incident.

The Wampanoag contributed greatly to the feast, which included fowl and probably venison, eels, shellfish, stews, vegetables, and beer.

Since Plymouth had few buildings and manufactured goods, most people ate outside while sitting on the ground with plates on their laps.

The men fired their long guns, ran races, and drank the spirits, struggling to speak in broken English and Wampanoag.

The First Thanksgiving at Plymouth Rock was probably not at all what we might envision it to be. Why, I bet you probably never heard of the Wampanoag before!

- Council approved asking Peggy if she would be interested in playing on Christmas morning.



Christ the King

Christ the King is not a festival of great antiquity, supplying the church year with neat narrative punctuation from time immemorial. In fact, the festival didn't emerge until the twentieth century,

and at first it had nothing to do with the end of the church year at all.

Pope Pius XI established Christ the King Sunday in 1925 to counter what he regarded as the destructive forces of the modern world: secularism in the West and the rise of communism in Russia and fascism in Italy and Spain, harbingers of Nazism soon to seize Germany. Pope Pius intended to oppose the totalitarian claims of these ideologies to the rule of Christ. By intention or coincidence,

the festival of Christ the King also coincided with the last Sunday in October, aligning with the Protestant celebration of the Reformation.

That was an "uh-oh moment." It needed to be moved...the date changed.

Placed at the end of the church year, with its traditional eschatological emphasis, the festival now proclaimed Christ as "the goal of human history, the focal point of the desires of history and civilization, the center of humankind, the joy of all hearts, and the fulfillment of all aspirations," in short, a positive reconstruction of the festival's original polemic against political ideologies.

In Christianity, ADVENT refers to the period of four weeks leading up to Christmas. It begins on the Sunday closest to NOVEMBER 30th, ST. ANDREW'S DAY and ends on December 24th. It is a "time of anticipation" and "preparation" for the birth of Jesus on Christmas morning.

Some people may know that the ADVENT SEASON focuses on "expectation" and think it is an anticipation of Jesus' birth, but that is only a part of it.

The word ADVENT is derived from the LATIN WORD "ADVENTUS," which means "coming" or "arrival," which translates to the GREEK WORD "PAROUSIA."

Scholars believe that during the 4th or 5th centuries in SPAIN and GAUL, ADVENT was a season of preparation for the baptism of NEW CHRISTIANS at the January Feast of the EPIPHANY.

EPIPHANY celebrated God's INCARNATION (or becoming flesh) represented by the visitation of the MAGI (or WISEMEN) to the baby Jesus, then, there was the celebration of his BAPTISM IN THE JORDAN RIVER by John the baptizer and his first miracle at the WEDDING FEAST at Cana in Galilee...

By the 6th century, however, Roman Christians had tied ADVENT to the coming of Christ. But the coming they had in mind was not Christ's FIRST COMING in the manger in BETHLEHEM, but his SECOND COMING as JUDGE of the world.

The ADVENT SEASON was not explicitly linked to Jesus' FIRST COMING at Christmas until the MIDDLE AGES. There is a long history of development here.

Hopefully, for some of you, this will be the first time you are hearing this...it is part of the LITURGICAL HISTORY of the church.

For the month of **November**, the pantry is requesting:


- Cartons of milk (available at dollar stores)

From the Kitchen of Saint Ruth

(Mother of PJ)

Beef Stroganoff

Ingredients:

- 1 slice round steak, cut ½ inch thick
- Instant unseasoned meat tenderizer
- 3 tbsp. flour
- 1 large, chopped onion
- 1 can (6 oz) sliced mushrooms
- 2 tbsp. chili sauce
- 1 tsp salt and ¼ tsp pepper
- 1 cup sour cream
- Oil for frying
- · Noodles, or rice for serving

Directions:

Moisten steak and sprinkle with meat tenderizer. Place on cutting board; cut into ¼ inch thick slices. Shake in paper bag with flour to coat it. Brown, a few slices sat the time in oil in a large frying pan. Remove, add onion and sauté just until soft. Return meat to pan. Stir in mushrooms and liquid, chili sauce, salt, and pepper. Cover. Simmer for 1 hour, or until meat is tender. Just before serving, stir about 1 cup of the hot meat and sauce mixture into sour cream in a small bowl, then stir back into remaining in frying pan. Heat very slowly just until hot. Serve over cooked hot noodles or fluffy rice if you wish.
