



Comment Article: “Getting closer to God”



Whether we feel ready or not, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Church's observance of the Lenten season—six weeks set apart to draw us closer to God and to seek him out “with greater intensity in our daily lives.”

It is not a long time. It is only six weeks. And frankly, I could use more time than that.

We never know quite how much time we have. And we always want more.

Unfortunately, the Lenten season often gets reduced to the question, “What are you giving up for Lent?” This is an okay question, but it can only take us so far.

The real question of the Lenten season is, “How will I repent and return to God with all my heart?”

With all my heart. My whole heart. The whole thing. Holding nothing back.

This begs an even deeper question: “Where in my life have I gotten away from God, and what are the disciplines that will enable me to find my way back?”

I have always taken Lent seriously. I have.

But I know down deep in my heart, if allowed to, I can slip-slide away, just like everybody else.

Not necessarily in big ways, but in little subtle ways...I have pulled away.

I have run away. I have turned my back on Him. I have turned my back on my values and what I hold dear.

Lent calls us home. Lent beckons to us. Lent calls to us to return.

Very much like a prodigal son or a prodigal daughter, it is time. Time to return to that place where I should have been all along.

But it is so easy today... I didn't read my devotions. I just skipped them, no biggie. I didn't pray. So what? I can pray tomorrow... I didn't do anything for others.

Sometimes it is easy to get caught up in ourselves, at others' expense. What about ME...

Don't I deserve everything that others have? Stinkin' thinkin' comes so easy to me sometimes...and I do know better...

The purpose of engaging in Lent is to become more finely attuned to our longing for God so we can TRULY seek him with all our hearts.

As we wrestle with a more realistic awareness of the grip our attachments have on us, we enter into godly grief that leads to repentance, then to forgiveness, and, prayerfully, to freedom.

Serious as the Lenten season is for me personally, it is also a time of "great hope" as we experience "God's steadfast love for us," even in the midst of whatever sin or sins we are acknowledging.


He loves us in spite of our backpaddling and our running away from him.

"In the shadow of Christ's cross and impending resurrection," we are assured that "there is forgiveness and cleansing for all who turn to him." There is. But we have to make that turn.

In him, there is the power to pass from death to life in the places where we ourselves need resurrection. Lent is about coming to him, turning to him, but it is also about coming into ourselves. So, I have decided I need Lent more than Lent needs me. Are you with me?

MORE THAN 60 years ago

According to the US CENSUS BUREAU, the city of Oak Creek has a total area of 28.6 square miles, of which 28.6 square miles is land, and 0.03% is water.

Oak Creek is located at 42 degrees, 53 feet 4 inches North and 87 degrees, 53 feet 57 inches West. Oak Creek is located South of Milwaukee, on the shore of Lake Michigan, in Milwaukee County. The area was inhabited by the Potawatomi and Menominee until the mid-1830s, when the United States government forced them off their land.

Wisconsin became a state on May 29, 1848, statehood being GRANTED by an act of Congress. Wisconsin became the 30th state in the UNION.

Like many of Milwaukee's suburbs at the time, Oak Creek was primarily an agricultural center, with numerous farms spread across the area. The railroad connecting Milwaukee and Chicago began running in 1855 and brought much commerce to the emerging village.

In addition to farming, major local businesses included the United States Glue Company, American Tar Products, and Lake Side Distillery. As the dairy industry began to dominate the state's agriculture, many creameries and cheese houses were also built.

In 1956, General Motors' AC Spark Plug was built in town. NASA selected the plant to participate in America's Space Program for the guidance and navigation systems onboard the APOLLO aircrafts in 1962.

In 1965, following graduation from the Seminary, Pastor Ray Stubbe was called by the Board of American Missions to explore planting a church. He was sent to Oak Creek, Wisconsin. His parents resided in Milwaukee, and his home congregation was Redeemer Lutheran Church at 19th and Wisconsin in downtown Milwaukee. So, Pastor Stubbe was somewhat familiar with the area. Pastor Stubbe found an apartment across from Oak Creek High School. It was from this apartment that his work would begin.

"Ecclesia Plantanda" was a phrase that was used by Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, the Patriarch of Lutheranism in North America. The Latin phrase means the church must be planted! The question was whether another church was needed or necessary in the Oak Creek area. That was 61 years ago.



Did You Know?

- Ash Wednesday is February 18th, 2026.
- Ash Wednesday is the first day of the church's liturgical season called LENT.
- Ashes represent repentance, mortality, and humility.
- Traditionally, the ashes are made in the form of a cross on the forehead.
- The ashes are made from the previous year's Palm Sunday palms.
- The words that echo throughout the church are "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you will return."
- Ash Wednesday is observed by Roman Catholics, Anglicans, Lutherans, Episcopalians, Methodists, and some other Protestant denominations.
- The Orthodox church does not celebrate Ash Wednesday.
- Ash Wednesday is a movable feast day and changes each year, depending on when Easter (The Resurrection of Our Lord) falls.
- The Season of Lent lasts forty days, not including Sundays.
- The tradition of Ash Wednesday has its roots in the early Christian church, where people publicly repented and were marked with ashes...
- Ash Wednesday is NOT CONSIDERED a "celebration" but rather a solemn observance in which the Eucharistic Meal is shared.
- The colors associated with Lent are purple or black, based on the congregation's tradition.
- Ashes are connected to Jesus' 40-day fast in the wilderness, prior to the beginning of his ministry, symbolizing repentance.



“The Transfiguration of Our Lord”

(The Last Sunday After Epiphany!)



The Transfiguration serves as a revelation (an epiphany) of Jesus' divine glory, confirming his role as the fulfillment of the law and the prophets.

The event acts as a foretaste of the coming KINGDOM OF GOD, emphasizing the divine nature of Jesus, to his closest disciples.


It is a theophany (a manifestation or visitation by God) that shows God's divinity through Jesus, celebrated in many, many Christian traditions.

The Transfiguration challenges believers to recognize Jesus' authority and align their lives with his teachings...

The Transfiguration marks the glorification of Jesus' human body, indicating the nearing conclusion of his earthly ministry.

Jesus is shown to be greater than the law and the prophets.

In the Transfiguration, Jesus, witnessed by his closest friends, is transformed into a being emanating intense white light who was also talking with two of the main figures of ancient Judaism. It is filled with awe and awesomeness!

Council Capsules

Council approved the following matters at the January council meeting:

- Council approved the motion by the Evangelism Chairperson to host Bingo on February 8th at 11:30 am.
- Council approved a motion by the Property Chairperson to allow Sara Jolitz to store her riding mower at the church and allow trained persons from the church to use the mower on the church grounds. An agreement will be written up and signed by both Sara and a representative from the church.
- Council approved a motion by the Property Chairperson to allow Michael Steiner to take the John Deere Tractor to Proven Power to find out what is wrong with it and get it repaired. Michael has offered to pay for the transport and the repairs.
- Council approved a motion by the Liturgy Chairperson to hold Lenten liturgies on Wednesdays during Lent.
- Council approved a motion to move the 29 people listed on the December statistical report to Inactive Status.
- Council approved a motion by Barb to move \$20,000 to an interest-bearing CD.

Boundaries...

It is all about boundaries and healthy congregations...and healthy pastors.

Pastors retiring are required to find a NEW CONGREGATIONAL HOME. Pj is a member of All Saints Lutheran Church; he will officially resign his membership as of May 24th, 2026.

Of primary concern is the health of the church family going forward.

Retired pastors cannot be called upon to perform any pastoral acts once they have left a congregation. Their call to that congregation has officially ended.

All pastors leaving congregations should refrain from “active engagement with ALL former members,” including digitally.

It is not uncommon for social media platforms to be problematic. It is not uncommon for such sites to be abandoned. Some pastors choose to unfollow or even unfriend former parishioners.

Most people do not know this, but a pastor's status on the “retired roster of the ELCA” is a privilege granted only by the Synod Council. It is not a right that is assumed.

Pastors who behave in a manner “that is inconsistent with the expectations of a rostered minister and public leader” may be denied entry onto the retired roster, or they may be “removed” by action of the synod council.

The ELCA Roster Manual indicates that “the status of every retired rostered minister” is to be reviewed at least every three years.

A pastor removed from the roster would then be considered “a layperson” and unable to conduct activities normally associated with ordained ministry.

It is truly all about establishing healthy boundaries going forward.

It is believed that a pastor's love for the congregation and its continued ministry is more important than “their affection for any specific individual or family in the congregation.”

Former means just that, “former.”







Can I or A Family Member Have a Church Funeral?



According to at least one legend, St. Valentine signed a letter "from your Valentine" to his jailer's daughter, whom he had befriended and healed from blindness.


Another common legend states that he defied the emperor's orders and secretly married couples to spare the husbands from being conscripted to serve in war.

BLAME IT ON THE GERMANS!

I bet you do not know the history behind “this thing.” The GROUND HOG DAY tradition originated from European folklore, specifically from German-speaking areas, where it was believed that if a “BADGER” emerged from its burrow and saw its shadow, it would indicate six more weeks of winter.

Since the 5th century, European Celts believed that animals had special senses to predict the weather. Local storytellers said marmots or bears had this supernatural ability, and some later changed this to groundhogs or foxes.

This belief was brought to the United States by the Pennsylvania Dutch immigrants in the late 19th century.

The first “official celebration” took place in 1887 in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania, where a groundhog named PUNXSUTAWNEY PHIL was chosen to predict the weather.

The day has since become a popular event in the United States and Canada, celebrated on February 2 of each year. If it is any consolation to you at all, they say, the groundhogs have only been accurate about 30% of the time.






